Species at Risk

BURROWING

Often distinguishable from other owls due to its preference for the ground.

What does it look like?

Small owl with large yellow eyes and long skinny legs.

Where can it be found? Burrowing owls prefer

relatively flat prairie and open pasture.

They do not make their own burrows—instead they use abandoned burrows created by burrowing mammals.

In fall, they migrate to the southern United States and Mexico.

Threats

Less burrows for owls to use due to fewer populations of burrowing mammals like ground squirrels and prairie

What can you do to recover this species? In Manitoba, burrowing owl populations

have decreased to near zero in recent decades but are slowly coming back thanks to recovery programs.

Landowners can help by preserving burrows created by burrowing mammals.
